



Percentage of young Americans who disagreed with this statement: "It is much better for everyone involved if the man is the achiever outside the home and the woman takes care of the home and family."












Education still pays off

Chart shows average wages by educational level. 2016 median wage is \$17.86 per hour or ~ \$37,148.80/year.






College required, whether needed or not

Twelve years after graduation (in 2012), solo practitioners in the Class of 2000 reported a median income of just \$50,000, with a full quarter of them reporting no income at all.

Today, students are borrowing an average of \$32,289 each year to attend a public law school and \$44,094 for a private one. The prospect of paying off \$97,000 to \$132,000 of law school debt, plus college debt, plus accrued interest—all with weaker employment outcomes than earlier classes—may overwhelm prospective students

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

Why Has Regional Income Convergence in the U.S. Declined?




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The Kalamazoo Promise

April 2017 Cities with the Largest Scarcity of Skills



"Scarcity" is when employer demand for a certain skill exceeds worker supply of that skill. To develop the list of cities with the largest scarcity of skills we calculated 50 of the largest U.S. cities' (in terms of Li membership) total skills gaps, determined what percentage of their skills gaps are caused by a scarcity of skills, and then compared each city's skills scarcity relative to each other.




Skills gap vary by location

Transitions from education to work are becoming more complex and uncertain




They are paying more than double the cost for higher education than the generation before - and much more than the free education obtained by their parents' generation










Exhibit 1: Skills acquired from one job are 'portable' to 13 other jobs, on average




7 new job clusters to help young people navigate the new work order
