

Smartphone Addiction Creates Imbalance in Brain

Released: November 30, 2017

CHICAGO – Researchers have found an imbalance in the brain chemistry of young people addicted to smartphones and the internet, according to a study presented today at the annual meeting of the Radiological Society of North America (RSNA).

According to a recent Pew Research Center study, 46 percent of Americans say they could not live without their smartphones. While this sentiment is clearly hyperbole, more and more people are


At A Glance

- · Smartphone and internet addiction increases the levels of a neurotransmitter called GABA in one region of the brain.
- GABA is an "inhibitory" neurotransmitter that regulates various brain functions, including anxiety.
- GABA ratios significantly correlated to clinical scales of internet and smartphone addictions, depression and anxiety.








TIJERAS, N.M. (AP) — New Mexico authorities say they were alerted to a potentially deadly domestic violence situation thanks to voice-activated smart technology.

The Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office detailed the case Monday, saying a woman had been threatened and hit in the face with a handgun.

Deputies believe a voice-activated smart device triggered a 911 call after the suspect asked the woman if she had called the sheriff.


Sheriff's spokeswoman Deputy Felicia Romero said the woman can be heard saying in the 911 recording: "Alexa, call 911." But Romero acknowledged that she's not sure what device might have been used.


<u>Use Emergency SOS on your iPhone</u>

Howard Rheingold's Five Literacies

- Attention: How much time and energy are you giving to your screens
- <u>Crap detection:</u> How to evaluate a source and making a educated guess about its origins and if it's trustworthy.
- <u>Participation:</u> This is all about knowing how to leverage collective intelligence.
- <u>Social know-how:</u> Closely related to participation are virtual communities and crowdsourcing as other ways to leverage collective intelligence.
- <u>Networks:</u> The ability to grasp how networks work as the final literacy.




The durability of information
