

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


Our fellow citizens are idiots







A different future is already in our classrooms

This fall, for the first time, the overall number of Latino, African-American, and Asian students in public K-12 classrooms is expected to surpass the number of non-Hispanic whites.



As in other urban districts, students in the WPS are demographically diverse. As shown in Table 4, over one-third, or 38.1% of the students enrolled in 2012-13 were Hispanic, 35.8% were Caucasian, 14.2% were African-American, 8.1% were Asian, and 3.5% were multi-race.

Worcester already has a minority majority school system



For the first time since Europeans arrived in this country, white Americans are being told that they will soon be a minority race. The declining white share of the national population is unlikely to change white Americans' status as the most economically well-off racial group, but symbolically, it threatens some whites' sense of dominance over social and political priorities.



Education is not the key determinant of equitable economic opportunities across generations


The decomposition of the variation in intergenerational transmission of income across areas of the United States for children born in the early 1980s




